

DAVID—THE CONFLICTED HERO

Vault verse for this series: Philippians 3:17 (ESV) *Brothers, join in imitating me, and keep your eyes on those who walk according to the example you have in us.*

- 1. David's story is one of **faith**, **failure**, and **redemption**.
- 2. David's story is told in <u>**1 &2 Kings**</u>, <u>**1 Chronicles**</u>, and <u>**1 Samuel**</u>.
- 3. His name is in the Bible approximately **<u>1100</u>** times.
- 4. He was born around **1000 BC**.
- 4. David's life was marked by mighty exploits and shocking failure.

1. David accomplished many <u>magnificent</u> achievements

- 1. He is first mentioned in scripture in **<u>1 Samuel 16</u>** when he is anointed by Samuel.
- 2. He was born in **<u>Bethlehem</u>** and was the youngest son of Jesse.
- 3. He came from a modest family and worked as a **<u>shepherd</u>**. A key term in his life.

Psalm 78:70–72 (NIV)⁷⁰ *He (God) chose David his servant and took him from the sheep pens;* ⁷¹ from tending the sheep he brought him to be the shepherd of his people Jacob, of Israel his inheritance. ⁷² And David shepherded them with integrity of heart; with skillful hands he led them.

- 4. He was a **poet** and **musician**.
- 5. David is traditionally credited with writing about half of the Psalms. 73 of 150
- 6. Even as a young man his life was marked by courage, faith, and humility.
- 7. At **<u>30</u>** he was anointed King of Judah and shortly after he was anointed King of Israel.
- 8. He was King for <u>40</u> years and ushered in the <u>Golden age</u> of Israel's history.
- 9. He positioned the **<u>next generation</u>** to build the Temple.

Acts 13:36 (NIV) "Now when David had served God's purpose in his own generation, he fell asleep; he was buried with his ancestors and his body decayed.

10. He was declared to be a "man after God's own heart." Acts 13:22

2. David experienced massive failures

- 1. His story has at least 4 **<u>significant</u>** failures that impacted thousands of people in the process.
- 2 Samuel 11 tells the shockingly evil story of David's sin with Bathsheba that results in adultery, murder, and the vilest deception. It also brought the punishment of God.
- 3. David at times **lacked** sound judgement regarding those he empowered. 2 Sam. 3
- 4. David failed to lead his family well. He had at least 8 wives and 10 concubines. He had at

least <u>19 sons</u> and <u>one named daughter</u>. There was <u>massive</u> conflict between them. 2 Sam 13-18

5. David <u>ordered</u> a census of Israel in 2 Samuel 24 which was an <u>offense</u> <u>toward</u> <u>God</u> and resulted in <u>70,000</u> Israelites dying. 2 Sam 24

IMPORTANT TRUTH TO LEARN: WHE THE DEVIL TEMPTS US TO SIN, HE TELLS US **OUR SIN IS INSIGNIFICANT** AND GOD'S GRACE IS ALWAYS PRESENT TO FORGIVE AND RESTORE; **BUT AFTER WE FAIL,** HE TELLS US **OUR SIN IS ENORMOUS** AND WE COULD NEVER BE FORGIVEN MUCH LESS RESTORED. **WHAT WE NEED TO LEARN**—ALL SIN IN DESTRUCTIVE AND WE SHOULD **RECOGNIZE THE POWER OF GRACE TO PREVENT OUR FALLING AS MUCH AS THE POWER OF GRACE TO RESTORE AFTER WE HAVE FALLEN.**

Romans 6:1–2 (NIV) ¹ What shall we say, then? Shall we go on sinning so that grace may increase? ² By no means! We are those who have died to sin; how can we live in it any longer? **1 John 1:9–2:1 (NIV)** ⁹ If we confess our sins, he is faithful and just and will forgive us our sins and purify us from all unrighteousness. ¹⁰ If we claim we have not sinned, we make him out to be a liar and his word is not in us. ¹ My dear children, I write this to you so that you will not sin. But if anybody does sin, we have an advocate with the Father—Jesus Christ, the Righteous One.

3. David expressed <u>deep</u> repentance and sorrow for his sins

- David <u>acknowledged</u> his sin with Bathsheba after being confronted by Nathan, the prophet.
 2 Sam 12
- 2. Psalm 51 is a masterpiece of true repentance.
- 3. David <u>accepted</u> the consequences of his sin as just, even if extremely painful.
- 4. David took responsibility for his actions.

4. David received <u>abundant</u> grace

- 1. God did not <u>abandon</u> David.
- 2. God <u>restored</u> him.
- 3. He lived a **good** and **productive** life.

LESSONS TO LEARN FROM THE LIFE OF DAVID:

- 1. Having a heart for God should be the goal of every follower of Jesus.
- 2. It is better to avoid sin than receive forgiveness.
- 3. Since God is gracious to the repentant sinner, we should be gracious also.
- 4. When we fail, we must follow David's example of quick and sincere repentance.

Psalm 51:10 (NIV) Create in me a pure heart, O God, and renew a steadfast spirit within me.
